Shake, Rattle & Roll

Making a RAINSTICK



History: The rainstick is a tubular rattle that through the ages has been used by many cultures in various ways. Some say that it was invented by the Aztecs in Mexico; others think that it originated in Peru. Long ago it was believed that creating the sound of falling rain would cause it to rain.

Supplies needed:

- Cardboard tubes (paper towels rolls, gift wrapping tubes, poster tubes etc.)
- Fabric or felt (to cut 2 end pieces for rolls, larger than the circumference of the tube)
- 2 elastic bands
- Rice, corn kernels, sunflower seeds or beans, to place inside rainstick
- Aluminum foil
- Hot glue or white glue
- Decorations to glue on the rainstick (beads, feathers, leaves, yarn, coloured paper etc.)

Instructions

- 1. Cut 2 circles of coloured fabric or felt at least double diameter of the tube
- 2. Place one of the circles on the bottom of the tube, fold the fabric over the end of the tube and secure it to the tube with a plastic band.
- 3. Once one side is sealed, add a cup or two of rice, beans, sunflower, corn kernels or a combination of all of them. Be careful not to make your rainstick too heavy
- 4. Twist a piece of aluminum foil into a long snake, about 6 inches long and put it inside the tube.
- 5. Seal the other end with the fabric and elastic.
- 6. Decorate your rainstick. You tie any kind of decorations to it, such as strips of coloured paper, or yarn, and you can glue feathers, stones, glitter etc.

Now you're a ready to call for rain. SHAKE, RATTLE & ROLL your rainstick.
